Reflection on Georgia Heir's Property Law Center Visit

This summer saw the conclusion of the Heir's Property Estate Planning services. In late 2021, the Georgia Heirs Property Law Center hosted a series of workshops educating residents and descendants on heirs property. In the following months they worked with several families to do estate planning for their last will and testament. This process concluded on June 11th, 2022, with the lawyers of the law center taking a weekend visit to the island, and meeting with 10 families to officially sign their last will and testament. We can not overstate our appreciation for their partnership with SICARS for this project. Part of SICARS's mission is to ensure land retention for residents and descendants of Hog Hummock, and the work of the Georgia Heirs Property Law Center helped inform the community of the importance of inheritance and ensure land ownership in the community.

In March 2022, SICARS officially launched a GoFundMe campaign. Protecting land ownership is part of SICAR's mission, as land both ties the community not only to the present and to each other, but also to its history and ancestry. The main goal for the funds raised is to meet the Right of First

Refusal, and the purchased land will go toward community use. Any excess funds would go toward the preservation of other properties, back tax and legal fund assistance for community members' properties, as well as repairing community buildings as needed. We are currently trying to raise \$200,000 to achieve this goal. While we are aware that this is a lofty amount, we believe in the power of outreach, and believe that with enough consistent support we will be able to meet this goal. Sapelo Island Lawsuit Reaches Settlement

Residents of Sapelo Island recently won a lawsuit against McIntosh County, in which they claimed they were denied adequate and necessary services by the county. Such services they claimed were denied included road service, emergency medical care, schools and education, and law enforcement. Furthermore, residents also claimed the county charged unfair garbage fees and gave residents unjustly high property taxes. The ruling was in favor of the residents, and those involved with the suit received \$750,000. The county will also be introducing new services to the island, including emergency medical truck, an updated firetruck, and increasing the frequency of road maintenance, and garbage fees will be reduced.

Clemson University Architecture Class Visits Sapelo Island

In July we welcomed an architecture class from Clemson University onto the island for site visits of several different locations across Hog Hummock. The students created proposals for projects such as affordable housing units, a business co-operative, a bed and breakfast, a cultural village, and a Boys and Girls club. SICARS President Ron Johnson, along with fellow Hannah Morris and intern Kris Smith showed the group to various locations in the community to highlight the history, culture, and existing architecture of the community. These projects are designed to fit within the scale and architectural language of the more traditional homes of the community. We thank them for joining us and hope they return again soon.
